From the desk of Kyle Kemp, Director of Religious Formation

This is the first in an ongoing series on Ecumenism — where Catholics and Protestants differ and those things which stand in the way of a single unified Christianity.

When Martin Luther was asked to recant his writings at the Diet of Worms, he responded that unless the council could use the sacred scriptures to disprove him, he saw no need to recant.

One of the tenets of the Protestant Reformation was “*Sola Scriptura*” (scripture alone). Luther, and those who followed, believed that the sacred scripture alone should form the foundation of Christianity—the belief that scripture alone reveals God’s presence and eternal plan.

Catholics differ from Protestants in that we believe that both scripture and tradition reveal who God is in our lives and that just as God revealed him[her]self through the life and actions of the past, he[she] continues to be revealed through the actions of today’s church. Thus the Gospels provide the foundation for the Sacrament of Baptism while tradition supports devotion to Mary and the Saints.

The second Vatican Council re-envisioned the Church’s understanding of Scripture in the lives of the faithful calling for greater study and celebration of the sacred scriptures. While most of the doctrines and practices which Luther and other Reformers found appalling were eliminated or de-emphasized, the roles which scripture and tradition continue to play in the Catholic Magisterium remain an obstacle to a single reunified Christian church.

However, even among Protestant faiths, there is no consensus on how *sola scriptura* is understood. Some congregations believe that everything not specifically prohibited in scripture is allowed; others believe that anything not specifically included in scripture is prohibited; and still others believe the truth lies somewhere in between these absolutes. These beliefs were influenced both by the reasons of the initial split from the universal Church and by the traditions of the congregation since its inception.

These differences, even within Protestantism, mean that while ecumenism and reunification are possible, it will be a slow journey of understanding how God is revealed in both scripture and in the works and lives of the faithful followers of Christ.

Biblical Canons

Most people probably know that Catholic bibles include seven additional books excluded by Protestants (1st and 2nd Maccabees, Baruch, Tobit, Judith, Wisdom, Sirach, as well as parts of Esther and Daniel). But few people understand why the two bibles are different.

Jews in Palestine formed a list of 39 books written in Hebrew which eventually became the Palestinian Canon. This Canon is also called the Septuagint because it was the work of seventy Jewish scholars. The early church adopted the Jewish canon and added inspired books written in Greek creating the Alexandrian Canon. This canon was translated into Latin by St. Jerome and is also known as the Vulgate,

(meaning the common language).

With the formation of Protestantism, Luther and others adopted the Palestinian Canon (those books translated from Hebrew only) while the Council of Trent adopted the Alexandrian Canon (books translated from Hebrew and Greek) as the official Canon of the Catholic Church.
